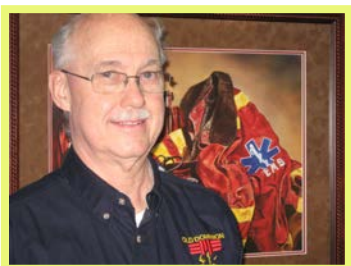

Code of Virginia

The Old Dominion EMS Alliance Inc. is one of 11 regional emergency medical services councils in the Commonwealth.

Section 32.1-111.11

The Board (of Health) shall designate regional emergency medical services councils which shall be authorized to receive and disburse public funds. Each Council shall be charged with the development and implementation of an efficient and effective regional emergency medical services delivery system.

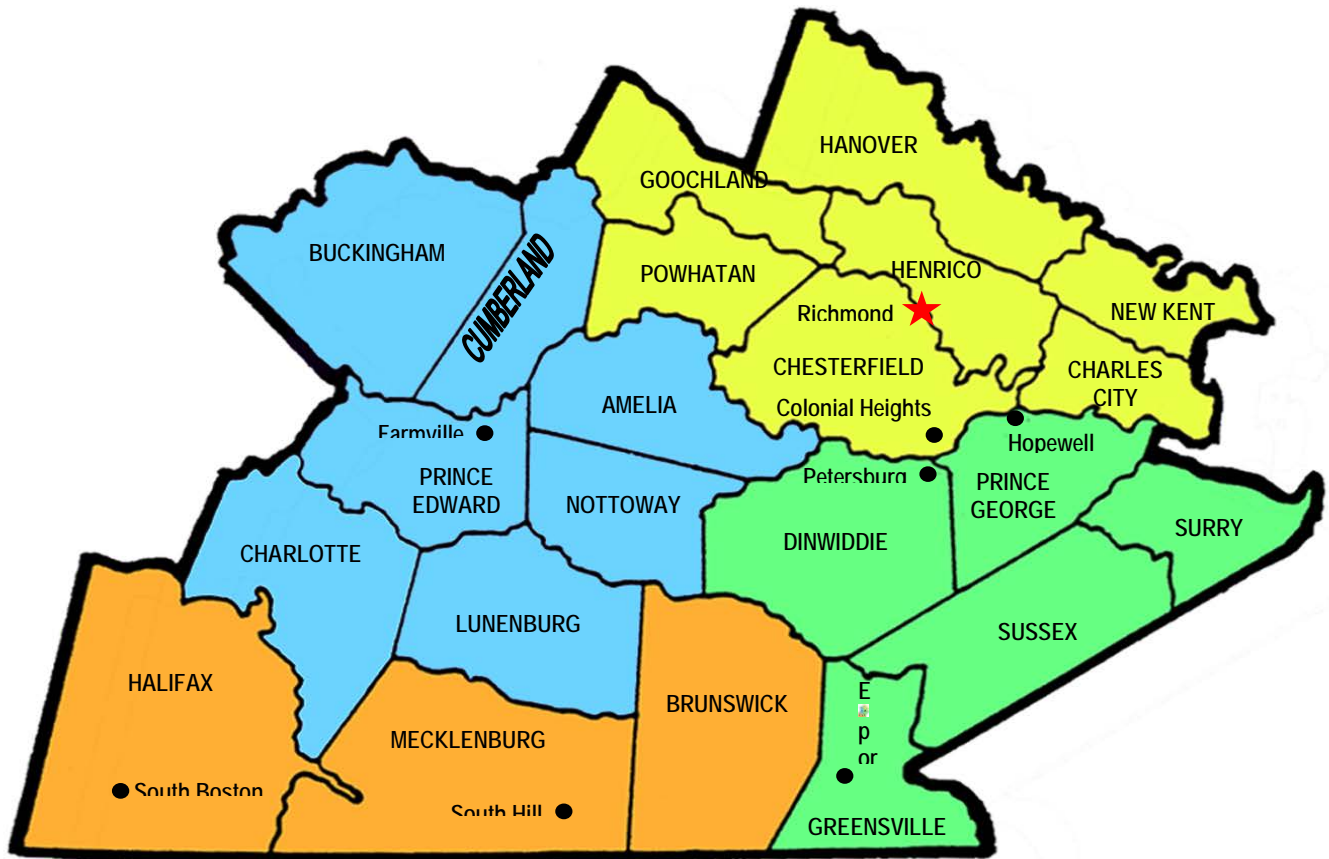
The Board shall review those agencies that were the designated regional emergency medical services councils. The Board shall, in accordance with the standards established in its regulations, review and may renew or deny applications for such designations every three years. In its discretion, the Board may establish conditions for renewal of such designations or may solicit applications for designation as a regional emergency medical services council.

Each Council shall include, if available, representatives of the participating local governments, fire protection agencies, law-enforcement agencies, emergency medical services agencies, hospitals, licensed practicing physicians, emergency care nurses, mental health professionals, emergency medical technicians (EMTs) and other appropriate allied health professionals.

Each Council shall adopt and revise as necessary a regional emergency medical services plan in cooperation with the Board.

The designated Councils shall be required to match state funds with local funds obtained from private or public sources in the proportion specified in the regulations of the Board. Money received directly or indirectly from the Commonwealth shall not be used as matching funds. A local governing body may choose to appropriate funds for the purpose of matching grant funds for any Council. However, this section shall not be construed to place any obligation on any local governing body to appropriate funds to any Council.

The Board shall promulgate, in cooperation with the State Emergency Medical Services Advisory Board, regulations to implement this section, which shall include, but not be limited to, requirements to ensure accountability for public funds, criteria for matching funds, and performance standards



The Old Dominion EMS Alliance is a non-profit, service organization designed to help local governments, rescue squads, municipal fire/EMS agencies, private ambulance services, hospitals and other interested parties develop and maintain the Central Virginia Emergency Medical Services System. Its 5,697 prehospital providers are partners with local doctors, emergency department physicians and nurses, pharmacists and other specialists to make available high quality EMS trauma and medical care to patients throughout the diverse region.

2010 Accomplishments

Manpower

- Conducted a regional EMS awards program that included soliciting nominations, judging responses, and conducting an awards presentation picnic attended by 150 hospital and out-of-hospital providers.
- Forwarded the names of the Regional EMS Award winners to the Virginia Office of EMS/VDH.
- Provided overall coordination and support for the regional Critical Incident Stress Management (CISM) team and its Coordinators. Additionally, maintained state accreditation for the regional CISM team through the Virginia Office of EMS/VDH.
- Responded to numerous phone calls and emails requesting information about ALS and BLS training opportunities in the region.
- Responded to multiple phone calls for information about EMS employment opportunities and volunteer EMS agency membership.
- Scheduled meetings of the local EMS councils and ODEMSEA committees for a 12 month period and published and otherwise distributed them throughout the region.
- Reviewed, updated and distributed to staff and Board Members the ODEMSEA Employee Handbook.
- Satisfied the Rescue Squad Assistance Grant for thirty CEU scanners and distributed them throughout the region.

EMS Education/Training

- Worked with Colonial Heights and Henrico Division of Fire to become satellite sites for EMT-Intermediate.
- Sponsored several EMT-Enhanced courses throughout the region.
- In cooperation with our partners in EMS, created the first in what will be a series of training videos for providers.
- Offered a “Designated Infection Control Officer (Basic)” course, taught by Katherine West.
- Restructured the CTS registration process to an on-line process. The process allows the Administrative Staff and Coordinators to streamline the process and provide an even better testing experience for the incoming candidates.
- Provided a CTS Evaluator Update course to refresh evaluators on the new CTS testing standards and inform them of the new registration process.
- Provided, at no cost, Respiratory Fit Test courses in all four Planning Districts.
- Supported PHTLS classes, ACLS classes, PALS classes, and AMLS classes in partnership with VCU Medical Center’s Center for Trauma and Critical Care Education.



- Continued to work with the Community Colleges and Universities within the Region to support their EMS programs.
- Assisted J. Sargeant Reynolds Community College with their Re-accreditation process.
- Assisted Fort Lee with their initial EMT-Intermediate Accreditation application.
- Coordinated "Super CEU Weekends" in three Planning Districts.
- Maintained CEU courses monthly in all four Planning Districts that satisfy the VA OEMS requirement for recertification.
- Sponsored and provided staff for VA OEMS EMT-Instructor Practical testing.
- Maintained a cadre of ALS evaluators for National Registry test sites and a cadre of BLS evaluator for State Consolidated Test Sites (CTS).
- Coordinated 27 State Consolidated Test Sites at various locations within ODEMSA's Planning Districts. This included registering and testing 1300+ students for the EMT-Basic and First Responder level.
- Conducted National Registry test sites for EMT-Enhanced, EMT-Intermediate and EMT-Paramedic students.
- Provided and increased the stock of our EMS library with videos and textbooks.
- Provided ALS and BLS training and testing equipment for courses taught within the Region.
- Provided classroom space.
- Provided audiovisual and other equipment for the 2010 Symposium as requested by the Virginia Office of EMS/VDH.
- Supported on a regional basis the statewide Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training programs with equipment, instructors and classroom space, and assisted with continuing education programs.

Medical Direction and Quality Improvement

- ODEMSA's Regional Medical Director assisted multiple (25+) EMS agencies by acting as their Interim OMD under the ODEMSA emergency OMD plan.
- Initiated a Hypothermia / ROSC Committee.
- The ODEMSA STEMI Committee began having quarterly meetings.
- Coordinated four quarterly meetings of ODEMSA's Medical Control Committee.
- Coordinated four quarterly meetings of ODEMSA's Professional Development Committee.
- Coordinated meetings of the Trauma PI Committee made up of hospital and prehospital representatives in the Region.
- Coordinated four quarterly meetings of the Regional Pharmacy Committee made up of representatives of the acute care hospital pharmacies in this Region.
- Coordinated four quarterly meetings of the ODEMSA Air Medical Committee made up of representatives of the regional air medical services, communications systems and EMS agencies.



- Monitored the regional ALS Drug Box exchange program and collaborated as needed with the Virginia Board of Pharmacy and the Virginia Office of EMS/VDH.
- Purchased and distributed more than 10,000 drug box locks to hospital pharmacies.
- Reviewed, updated, and distributed to hospitals and agencies the Regional Ambulance Restocking and Re-supply Policies.
- Reviewed, updated and distributed to hospitals and agencies the Regional Trauma Triage Policy.
- Reviewed and updated the Regional Air Medical Evacuation Guidelines.

Mass Casualty Incident

- Took delivery of large catchment of N95 respirator masks for disbursement to agencies.
- Collected and properly disposed of thousands of Mark I kits that had expired.
- Re-convened the ODEMSA MCI Committee.
- Began a major update to the Regional Mass Casualty Incident Plan.
- Supported on a regional basis the statewide Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training programs with equipment, instructors and classroom space, and assisted with continuing education programs.
- ODEMSA was represented on the Richmond Regional MMRS Steering and Strategic Planning committees.

Other Planning and Coordination Activities

- Published quarterly financial reports, Board minutes, frequent committee minutes and training and other event notices.
- Served as a consistent point of contact for EMS providers, EMS agencies, and local governments.
- Provided ODEMSA representation on numerous local, regional, and state committees and boards including:

- Provided two standardized grading programs for all RSAF grant applications submitted by agencies in Planning Districts 13, 14, 15 and 19. This grading process, carried out by representatives of EMS agencies in those districts, resulted in the Rescue Squad Assistance Fund awarding a total of \$804,983 in RSAF funds to 23 agencies in ODEMSA in the spring 2010 and fall 2010 grant cycles.
